Conference Workshops

Friday, 16 October. Workshops last ninety minutes and are presented twice to allow participants variety. (On the registration form, choose two and one alternative.)



F1. The Fullness of Life: How Dying Affects Our Living

'Contemplate death if you would learn how to live'. Taking these words of the Stoic philosophers to heart, we will uncover (through philosophy, spirituality, and psychology) some of the widespread attitudes about death and dying across cultures. We will explore some of the unconscious processes that inhibit life from being lived to the full in the here and now.

Dilly Baker and Alison Thompson run 'The Open Table,' which offers training and consultancy in the areas of diversity, spirituality, and motivational training. Dilly is an Anglican priest, well-known retreat leader, and author. Alison is an experienced leader and mentor in private industry, in the public sector, and in a range of church settings.



F2. Aspects of Love

Being present is about connecting to others: loving. Unfortunately, our conventional society portrays love only in terms of romantic or sexual relationships. Other aspects of love will be explored. By extending the scope of our loving actions and activities, we'll learn how to be truly present in the world in many, wonderful, ways.

Keith Beasley is a Reiki Master/Teacher and Life Guide. Until recently he ran a retreat house in Portugal and is now undertaking postgraduate research in "Transcending Thought" at Bangor University, Wales.



F3. Be Still and Know

In today's fast paced, noisy, pain-filled world, spirituality calls out for silence and resistance. Participants will be encouraged to develop a spirituality of resistance, which emphasizes place, nature, and the meaning of silence and stillness. We will be open to the presence of the Divine. The labyrinth will be offered as a vehicle for connecting the self and the Divine.

Rev. Vivette Jennings, MA in Spiritual Formation, BA in Theology, is an Anglican priest serving as Spiritual Director, Retreat Master, and Administrator at Hillcrest Retreat Centre in St. Anne's, Jamaica.



F4. Spiritual Growth in the Jewish Tradition

In Judaism, there have been very different approaches to spiritual growth, both conceptual and methodological. We will look at short exemplary texts (English translations) from different periods and from different streams of Judaism and discuss their value for spiritual directees today. We will practise some helpful spiritual exercises from the Jewish tradition.

Dr. Hannah Nathans, BA, CMC, Zeist, Netherlands, founded HaMakor, Centre for Jewish Spirituality. She is a Jewish spiritual director and teaches worldwide Jewish Spirituality, Enneagram, and Kabbalah.



F5. The Mystery of Healing Told by Five Fingers

Learn an ancient Chinese practice to integrate the practical with the spiritual by playing the “Healing Finger Game.” Find out how to be more present to and recognize feelings of loneliness, fear, anger, sadness, down-heartedness, and embrace them with the higher frequencies of love, protection, strength, comfort, joy.

Vivienne Rauber from Zürich, Switzerland, studied Catholic Theology and Psychology. She teaches Process Acupressure and “Therapy with Energy and Process” (TEP) to form “self-help teachers” in Europe and South America.



F6. Sensing the Holy: Touching the Earth, Singing the Word, Praying the Body

Philip Roderick will share some of the playful and profound ingredients that inform firstly, his love of nature as a vehicle for spiritual insight; secondly, his delight in the rhythm of life; thirdly, his simple but powerful recovery and development of body prayer from different spiritual traditions, ranging from Qi Gong to Judaism and Celtic Christian.

Philip Roderick is the founder director of The Quiet Garden Movement, the leader of Contemplative Fire, an Anglican priest, percussionist, educator and author of Beloved: Henry Nouwen in Conversation.



F7. Poetry and Presence: The Door, the Window, and the Listening Ear

This creative writing workshop starts with attention to the natural world and explores the writing process itself as a spiritual discipline. You will encounter a few poets whose work exemplifies the creative process and write from your own encounter with natural objects. No previous creative writing experience needed.

Andrew Rudd, from Cheshire, England, is a published poet, university lecturer, and Lay Reader. He leads retreats, quiet days, and writing workshops, exploring poetry and spirituality.

S1. Being Present to Our Celtic Spiritual Heritage

Music, poetry, storytelling, and meditation all combine in an exploration of the heritage and uniqueness of Celtic spirituality. Cath’s university thesis focused on the potential for generative conversation between neo-paganism and Christianity. An inclusive nature of Celtic spirituality will be highlighted in this reflective and experiential workshop.

Cath Connelly’s passion is Celtic spirituality. A spiritual director and gifted Celtic harpist, she is based in Melbourne, Australia.



S2. Group Spiritual Direction: Community for Discernment

“Put quite simply, I would describe spiritual direction as an act of prayer.” We will explore the underpinnings of group spiritual direction as an act of prayer, and consider the fitness of the process for groups in varied settings, including gatherings of spiritual directors.

Rose Mary Dougherty, SSND lives in Silver Spring, Maryland, USA. She has offered spiritual direction for over thirty years. Currently she ministers to hospice care-givers and the dying. She is author of two books and a DVD on group spiritual direction.



S3. Discernment in the Public Arena

Our post-modern world badly needs discernment on public issues and in public places. We will explore how to adapt the principles of Ignatian discernment to all areas of life. It challenges us to play a discerning role even in settings that are far less than ideal. Through us, the Spirit can be heard in the public arena.

Brian Grogan SJ, PhD, former Director of the Dublin Jesuit Centre of Spirituality and Jesuit Novices and former President of Milltown Institute, Dublin, Ireland, is currently Associate Professor in Spirituality and author of five books.



S4. Being Present and the Process of Spiritual Growth

An essential characteristic of spiritual life in the Judaeo-Christian tradition is that it describes a biographical development, a spiritual growth. For that process "being present" is important, as an everyday exercise. We will share experiences from the spiritual tradition, discuss presence among participants and will close with a spiritual exercise.

Prof. Dr. Michael Plattig, OCarm, was born in 1960 in Fürth, Bayern, Germany. He is a Carmelite, Doctor of Theology, Doctor of Philosophy, and Director of the Institute for Spirituality in Münster.



S5. Standing on the Edge: Accompanying People on the Periphery of Religious and Spiritual Traditions

We will enhance the skills and spiritual lives of all religious traditions by including guided visualisation: what it feels like to stand on the edge; creating in words or pictures an experience of God; contemplative focusing on a found object, listening, and identifying responses which support spiritual direction.

Peter Varney is a spiritual accompanier and retreat leader. He is experienced in being on the edge as both a Quaker and an Anglican priest, an anthropologist in Borneo, and a counsellor in Britain.



S6. The Birth of Bhride

Commencing with an entertaining, ancient, folk play about tension, we will enter the eventual battle concluding with the Spirit of Bhride being born, fertilizing the land, and creating abundance and health. Participants will learn to make Bhride's Crosses and be encouraged to carry the crosses through a reproduction of our Labyrinth Garden to experience a resurrection of their own abundance.

John Willmott was taught to read with only a bible at five-years-old and made an ancient passage cairn his "den" at six-years-old. John's journey for over fifty years has been exploring stories, ritual, prayer, and sanctuary.

Evening Sessions

Friday, 16 October: An Evening of Story with Megan McKenna

Live Inside a Story! [Do you know what story you're in?]

In Eastern Europe the Matrishka dolls nest inside one another: largest down to tiny ones. Our individual stories are those tiny little ones and we usually begin our stories from inside and then work our way up, but rarely out! What if we told our stories starting with the large all encompassing ones? Would it change our stories? We will look at our story in light of the larger stories: the stories of the Trinity, the Universe, and the Spirit in the World. Perhaps we will find ourselves hidden more securely and deeply in the heart of the mystery of God.



Megan McKenna is an internationally known author, theologian, storyteller, and lecturer. She holds graduate degrees in Scripture, Adult Education and Literacy from the Graduate Theological Union and the University of California, Berkeley, USA, and a Masters in Systematic Theology from Catholic University, Washington, DC, USA. But foremost she is a lover of words and how these both convert and transform us and bring meaning and hope to our world.

Saturday, 17 October: An Evening of Irish Arts hosted by Claire Roche

Inviting friends and colleagues to join her, internationally known harpist, Claire Roche, will host an evening celebration of Irish music, song, poetry, and performance.

Claire Roche has performed at the National Concert Hall in Dublin as well as at many venues around the world. Claire has recorded several CDs including Dancing in the Wind, poems by W. B. Yeats set to music. Claire has chosen to use her gift to gently warm the hearts of those who are present and fire their spirits into passion, courage, tears, love, and laughter.



Frequently Asked Questions

Wouldn't it be better to meet at a retreat house, rather than a hotel?

Yes. For smaller, localized events, Spiritual Directors International offers programs in retreat houses. Retreat house facilities are not available for the size of the group expected for the Dublin events. Because this is an international gathering, Spiritual Directors International selected a location near the Dublin airport. The Regency Hotel offers free hotel shuttle return to the airport as an added convenience for out-of-country travelers. We also selected this hotel because of its close proximity to a bus route, which enables local participants to easily commute and provides out-of-country travelers the opportunity to venture into Dublin by bus.

Why doesn't Spiritual Directors International offer an all-inclusive conference rate that incorporates three meals a day and accommodations?

After receiving years of feedback advising Spiritual Directors International not to provide an evening meal, the conference fee includes midday meals only. Participants told us they want the freedom to go out, to dine more lightly in the evening, or not have an organized meal at all. Some participants will be commuting locally and will not want to pay for an evening meal or for a hotel. Consequently, accommodations are priced separately from the conference. Since the hotel rate is in EUR, participants will pay directly for the hotel in EUR, given that EUR will be convenient for many people. That's how Spiritual Directors International arrived at the current conference format with accommodations paid separately and only some meals.

Will breakfast and an evening meal be included in my conference fee?

Your conference fee includes two midday meals, on Friday and Saturday. If you have secured a room in the Regency Hotel, breakfast is included in the cost of accommodations.

Can I pay in my local currency? Why doesn't Spiritual Directors International offer fixed currency rates for the conference fee?

Yes, you can pay conference fees in your local currency. Ideally, in a more stable global economy, Spiritual Directors International would offer multiple fixed rates for the conference: CHF, DKK, EUR, GBP, USD, etc. Due to the current, volatile, currency markets, Spiritual Directors International is pricing the conference in one currency. Because Spiritual Directors International is purchasing materials and booking rooms for presenters in USD, the conference fee is in USD. Nonetheless, you are welcome to pay in a local currency; we simply cannot fix the currency rates. When paying with a credit card, your bank will calculate the currency conversion for you. To pay by cheque or money wire, please contact the Spiritual Directors International office at membership@sdiworld.org for current currency rates.

Will a priest preside at a Mass on Sunday? Will a rabbi preside at a Saturday Havdalah service?

No. Spiritual Directors International events attract an increasingly diverse spiritual learning community. Throughout the conference, individual participants might feel called to go offsite to local houses of worship, depending on their spiritual tradition. We will provide local worship information, however, offsite worship is the individual participant's responsibility. During the conference, we will share sacred time together and participate in rituals designed specifically to celebrate the blessings of being present to a diverse Spiritual Directors International conference community.

Additional Information

Location. The conference will be held at the Regency Hotel Conference Centre, Swords Road, Dublin 9, Ireland. A limited number of rooms have been reserved at the conference rate of €85.00 per night for single occupancy and €110.00 for twin share and double occupancy. All rooms are en-suite. Be sure to mention Spiritual Directors International to get the special rate. Please make your hotel reservations as soon as possible by calling +03531 8371531 or e-mailing regency@regencyhotels.com. Reservations must be made by 1, September 2009. After this date, or once the group block is filled, the prevailing rate will apply.

Ground Transportation. The Regency Hotel Conference Centre provides a free return airport shuttle to Dublin International Airport and free car parking for participants and guests. The hotel is also located directly on the bus line from the Dublin Airport to downtown. Bus schedule and rates are available online at www.dublinbus.ie. Buses from the Airport to the Hotel are the 16a or 41; from downtown Dublin to the Hotel use buses 3, 33, 16, 16a or 41. Driving directions and maps will be sent to you a few weeks before the conference.

Scholarships and Bursaries. Priorities for bursaries, partial scholarships, and work-exchange scholarships are for people who have been members of Spiritual Directors International for two years or more and who live in developing countries. To apply for financial assistance, please submit the following to the events coordinator, events@sdiworld.org, before registering: 1) amount requested; and 2) statement describing how attending this event will benefit your ministry and Spiritual Directors International in your geographic area. Do not register until you have been notified of the status of your financial request. Financial assistance will be awarded on a first-come, first-served basis for as long as funds are available.

Scholarship and Bursary Donations. For many people, especially participants from developing countries, interns, and people on fixed incomes, attending the conference is not possible because of cost. Please make a donation to the scholarship and bursary fund. Thank you for sharing your generous heart with others in need!

Information Sharing. All conference participants are invited to bring brochures and program materials to share with others. Table space is provided, free of charge, for information sharing.

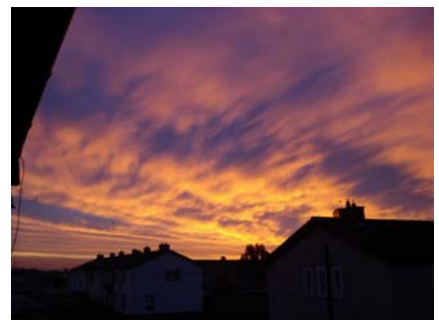
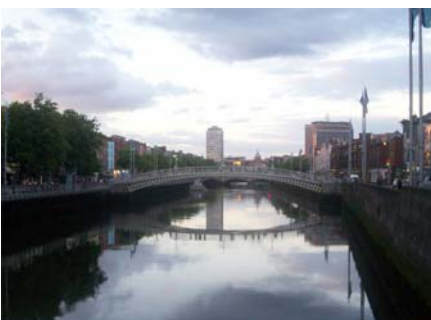
